Philippa Karsera Christodoulides is the spouse of the President of the Republic of Cyprus, Mr. Nikos Christodoulides.

In November 1999, she joined the Diplomatic Service of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and has since served as a career diplomat both in Cyprus and abroad. Since October 2024, she has been serving as Head of the Directorate for Schengen and Consular Affairs as Minister Plenipotentiary. Throughout her diplomatic career, she has served at the High Commission of the Republic of Cyprus in the United Kingdom, at the Embassy in Athens and the Permanent Representation of Cyprus in Brussels, during the first Presidency of Cyprus to the Council of the European Union.

She has also headed the General Secretariat of European Affairs at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and served as an adviser to the President on European affairs, in the capacity of EU Sherpa.

Philippa Karsera Christodoulides studied Political Science, International and European Affairs at the Panteion University of Social and Political Sciences in Athens and War Studies at the Kings College in London. Recently she has obtained an L.L.B. Law Degree from the University of Cyprus.

I don't believe in perfection any more. We all pursue happiness and we deserve happiness. The love and support of one's family, sharing precious moments with people we love, growing together. The ability to serve and make a meaningful contribution to society and help your country to promote its interests and its people to live in prosperity. Professional fulfillment and family with common roots. Love, sharing, and giving to all.

What is your greatest fear?

Not to be strong enough to address any challenge and obstacle that might arise and stand by my children. I also worry about younger generations being so much attached to social media and image. As a mother, and as an individual committed to advancing social issues, I also worry about the challenges that future generations might face. I am heartened to see that this government is actively implementing numerous social policies that make a real difference in people's lives, particularly for our youth and vulnerable groups.

Which living person do you most admire and why?

I deeply admire the women of Cyprus who showed remarkable strength and resilience after 1974, managing to rebuild their lives, support their families, and raise their children under incredibly difficult circumstances. These women are the true heroines of life. Their courage and determination continue to inspire me, as they demonstrated how unwavering spirit and hard work can overcome even the most challenging situations. One of these women is my mother Despo and of course my late grandmother Anna who managed to start again, after being expelled from their homeland in Famagusta, and offered us a good life.

What do you consider the most overrated virtue?

I don't believe any virtue is overrated, as long as we maintain balance and avoid excess. Each virtue has its own value and importance in life, but

like everything else, it's about finding the balance and applying it wisely depending the circumstances.

Which words or phrases do you most overuse?

One of my favorite sayings is, "Even a journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step." I truly believe that meaningful change happens gradually, one step at a time. It's about the smaller, consistent steps we take together. Every initiative, no matter how small it may seem at first, contributes to a greater purpose. For me, this belief goes hand in hand with empathy and practical action. When we combine a thoughtful approach with the willingness to take those first steps, we create opportunities for positive change, both for individuals and for the communities we serve. As long as there is the vision of the big Change. Cyprus is already witnessing important changes, and I believe that Nikos' election as President was a clear sign from the people that they wanted a more human-centered approach to governance and real political reform.

If you could change one thing about yourself, what would it be?

I would like to achieve, what I am trying hard and I am nearly there, remaning consistently focused on my vision, my own work, my personal goals without any disruptions from the "noise" coming from people who do not mean well or fake news. I read something really wise the other day "don't take criticism from someone you wouldn't take advice from".

What do you consider your greatest achievement?

Achievement is a rather heavy word. However, as any mother, I would tell you that I am extremely proud of my daughters who, despite the challenges first deriving from the constant change of countries due to their parents' job as diplomats and then from the fact that their father became a politician and is a public figure with all that this entails, have grown to be empathetic, humble, considerate citizens, persons who help others and are grounded. And that I personally, despite the challenges, managed to stay

committed to my young dream to serve my country as a diplomat, while growing our family and raising four wonderful young ladies.

What is your most marked business characteristic?

I love my job. I am a passionate diplomat; I am devoted to my mission. I worked hard to be as successful as possible in what I am doing. And I keep working and studying hard. I believe I do well in negotiations. I always feel that I have to be well prepared, I set my goals, and the bar is always high. I love working with capable people, people who inspire me and I can learn from them. I am a team player and I believe to the remarkable results that a good team can bring. I am highly organized and persistent. I follow the implementation of my goals. I thrive on challenge, constantly review my goals so I have something to strive towards.

What do you most value in people?

Empathy and also, I admire the characteristic of not feeling insecure, giving space and encouraging others to progress, thrive and go further than you.

Which historical figure do you most identify with?

Eleftherios Venizelos, the Greek revolutionary leader who defined the contemporary history of Greece, expanded the country and his economic and social reforms set the core for Greece evolution and transition in the 20th century. A true visionary, who faced challenges but remained focused on his overarching goal and vision, committed to Greeks, a tough and skilled negotiator who was also capable to be consensual. He was also deeply caring, discreetly taking care of Spinalonga lepers.

What is your motto?



Mrs Annita Demetriou is the first woman and the youngest person to serve as President of the House of Representatives of the Republic of Cyprus. In 2016, she was first elected as a member of parliament and re-elected in 2021. She was also elected as President of the Democratic Rally (DISY) party of Cyprus in March 2023. She holds a university degree on Social and Political Sciences as well as a postgraduate title in International Relations and European Studies.

She is an ambassador of the global network of women politicians - Women Political Leaders (WPL) and represents Cyprus in the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU). She participates in the Conference of Speakers of EU Parliaments (EUSC), in the European Conference of Presidents of Parliament of the Council of Europe, the Euro-Mediterranean Parliamentary Assembly (EMPA), the Conference of Speakers and Presiding Officers of the Commonwealth as well as in the Conference of Presidents of Parliaments of Small European States.

She aims for and strives towards the advancement of parliamentary work, the modernisation and digital transformation of the functioning of the House of Representatives as well as the strengthening of communication with the citizens, within an interactive framework. Her priorities include, among other issues, the promotion of human rights, the eradication of gender stereotypes, the protection of the environment and the strengthening of parliamentary diplomacy.

Dr Michaelidou is a graduate of the Cyprus Pedagogical Academy and has received her bachelor's degree from the University of Thessaloniki. She has an M.A. in Education from the University of Manchester and has completed a Ph.D. in Educational Studies at the University of London, specializing in educational research and evaluation. Having served as a public-school teacher, she then went on to teach as a professor of Pedagogy at the Cyprus Pedagogical Institute, also serving in the positions of Head of the Research and Evaluation Department, Head of the Educational Research and Evaluation Centre and, finally, as its director. In this capacity, she served as Acting Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sport and Youth (MOECSY) and has represented the Ministry abroad in working groups of the European Commission on education issues. She also worked as collaborating educational staff at the Open University of Cyprus and the University of London.

Dr Michaelidou has coordinated a number of horizontal actions and innovations of MOECSY and has coordinated and taught for many years seminars and programmes on educational innovation, action research and educational policy. Her research interests mainly concern professional development and the introduction of innovations in education.

In July 2022, by decision of the Council of Ministers, Dr Michaelidou was appointed as Acting Permanent Secretary of the Deputy Ministry of Culture, bringing her extensive knowledge of educational administration to build a strong foundation for the newly established Deputy Ministry.

Dr Michaelidou comes from Kyrenia and is a mother of two.



Which historical figure do you most identify with?




